



Appendix 1: Summary of careers of men first commissioned in 1744

All data is taken from Syrett, Commissioned Sea Officers.

In 1744 first commissions were awarded to 129 lieutenants. Of these men twenty one (16.3 per cent) are not mentioned again in Syrett, which means that not even the dates of their deaths are known. The charts above record the careers of the 108 men for whom at least a date of death is known.

In each case the years spent at each level of promotion have been counted and rounded up or down as necessary. In Chart 1, Lieutenant No 1 (John Acton) lived only two years after he was commissioned, whereas Lieutenant No 17 (**Thomas Burnett**) was 12 years as lieutenant before spending a year as master and commander and then the rest of his life as a captain. In Chart 2 No 21 (**Archibald Kennedy**) is also a member of the 1757 cohort studied in this thesis.

A date of death is recorded without any further promotion for 44 men (34.1 per cent). Some of these died almost immediately: one the next year, four within two years. Of the remaining 64 only 50 (38.7 per cent) were promoted to master and commander. The vital promotion to post captain was only achieved by 35 men (27.1 per cent). Finally seven men (5.4 per cent) became Admirals: James Gambier, George Clayton, Augustus Keppel, William Lloyd, Mark Milbank, Nicholas Vincent and Charles Webber.

At the other end of the scale there were those such as Henry Byng (No 18 in Chart 1) who was superannuated as a Commander in 1796 and died in 1812, 68 years after being commissioned. Others served more than 30 years: Wildy French (No 49 in Chart 1) died in 1791, after 47 years as lieutenant; James Furneaux (No 50 in Chart 1) and Isaac Hoy (No 13 in Chart 20 in 1783 after 39 years; William Cragg (No 34 in Chart 1) died in 1777 after 33 years as a lieutenant. Of the men who were not made post, the average time served was 25 years.

The extensive research in the half pay records which would be needed to establish how many active years each served has not been done, so the length of time on half pay has not been entered onto the charts. From the experience gained in following Thomas Burnett and his peers it is clear that a proportion of the years between first commission and independent command would have been spent on half pay during the years of peace.

The fact that this 1744 cohort produced thirty five post captains and seven admirals provides reassurance that concentrating on the second 1757 cohort of thirty five men who produced six admirals is statistically sound.
